“ I met Bob in 1983 after coming to North Missouri as a Field Service Agent for the North Central Region. I started my career with MDC as an Conservation Agent and fit in well with the Protection bunch in Brookfield. One of my duties was to advise and supply Agents with materials for habitat management in their respective counties. I was always scheduling time at their Regional meetings, usually at the "Wagon Wheel" Restaurant just up the street from the Regional Office. Carl Rude and Bob were great to work with and always welcomed me to whatever was going on in the region. With my background, I usually was recruited by Bob to help out with a check station during deer and turkey season. My clearest memory of Bob is his stories. The ending was usually the same. He would cock his head to one side, point his finger at me, and with a high pitched laugh say, "See, huh!" There was usually no comments in response, just a laugh. He was always glad to see me and greeted me as a friend.
